For more than ten years, NJSRN and its members have been committed to finding permanent, loving homes for rescued Miniature Schnauzers and Schnauzer mixes throughout the northeastern United States. NJSRN currently serves Connecticut, Delaware, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, and Pennsylvania.

NJSRN is not a shelter. Our dogs are cared for in private foster homes until they are adopted. Since 1997, NJSRN has rescued and re-homed nearly 1,600 Schnauzers!

NJSRN is an all-volunteer organization. We have no shelter, no employees, and no overhead expenses. All donations go toward the care and re-homing of Schnauzers in need. Your donations cover the costs of spay/neuter surgeries; vaccinations; testing and treatment for heartworm and other internal parasites; dental cleanings and extractions, if necessary; and urinalysis to check for infections or stones.

It All Started With One

Fred the Schnauzer

Fred's rescue is the story of one dog's gentle soul, one family's healing love, and the rescue that started NJSRN.

After reading about the horrible abuse and neglect that Fred had faced, Sherri and John Ruschmeyer quickly decided that they wanted to give this dog a second chance. At the time, Fred was living in a foster home near Austin, Texas. But his story began sometime before that date in August 1997. It



began when someone noticed Fred, all alone, chained to a fence in the hot Texas sun.

Fred didn't know it, but his luck was about to change. The person who saw him posted a message to an Internet group known as the "Hoflin Schnauzer List" (now the International Miniature Schnauzer List on YahooGroups). Nadine Tare and Lisa Winters read about him, and soon people from Texas to New Jersey were working together with one goal in mind - saving Fred. That's how he ended up in a foster home near Austin, and how Sherri and John came to find him.

The first trott for soldey Sellitudget treated the first time.

Kids had used Fred as a target for shooting their BB guns. Occasionally someone would give him food and water, but he rarely had human (or humane) contact. "I never wanted another dog to have to go through what Fred did," said Sherri. "Fred started Nadine Tare's and my passion for rescue." "In spite of everything," - the inhumane treatment, starvation, and exposure to the elements - "Fred was a gentle, forgiving dog. Because of his early experiences, he could have become aggressive, but he didn't." He eventually lost his leg from a melanoma in his paw, but he never lost his zest for life. During his time with the Ruschmeyers, he was a loving family member and constant companion. When Sherri and John adopted their daughter, Faith, Fred would sit beside her crib, making sure she was OK, and alerting Sherri and John if she started to cry.

Some choose to turn away when they see the sadness or neglect and to pretend they don't exist. For NJSRN and its members, that isn't possible. We see sadness in the dogs who lose their loving homes. We see neglected dogs, scared stays, and the victims of irresponsible breeding, pet stores, and puppy mills. We remember Fred's gentle soul and how one family's love healed him, and we know that we can help give a needy Schnauzer another chance at a good life in a permanent, loving home. For Fred and the nearly 1,600 Schnauzers that have come after him, we've chosen to focus on the good things that come from rescuing Schnauzers in need, and in finding them forever homes. This keeps Fred's spirit alive. This is Fred's legacy. We think he would approve.
